Henry worked 70 hours a week. He loved his job and brought home a sizeable paycheck to provide good things for his family. He always had plans to slow down but he never did. One evening he came home with great news – he had been promoted to the highest position in his company. But no one was home. Over the years, his children had grown up and moved out, his wife had found a career of her own, and now the house was empty. There was no one to share the good news with.

Solomon talked about the need to keep a balance in life with our work. He wrote, "Fools fold their hands and ruin themselves" (Eccl. 4:5). We don't want to go to the extreme of being lazy, but neither do we want to fall into the trap of being a workaholic. "Better one handful with tranquility than two handfuls with toil and chasing after the wind" (v.6). In other words, it is better to have less and enjoy it more. Sacrificing relationships at the altar of success is unwise. Achievement is fleeting, while relationships are what make our life meaningful, rewarding, and enjoyable (vv. 7-12)

We can learn to work to live and not live to work by choosing to apportion our time wisely. The Lord can give us this wisdom as we week Him and trust Him to be our Provider.

Lord, show me if my priorities are skewed and where I need to make changes. Thank You for the gift of family and friends.

Pastor's Corner of Light: Don't Miss the Moment CT/Pastors March 26, '24 Rich Perez

Rich Perez shares some insights with his parenting experiences:

The childhood days of my son are gone: He's not a kid anymore. He is growing up and things feel like they are changing. It's a phase, they say, but don't miss it. I think of the story in Genesis 28 when Jacob wakes up from his sleep and his dream. He says to himself: "Surely the Lord is in his place, and I did not know it."

God is present and often at work in our lives, among the people we live with and we can often fail to be aware of it. I wonder, can God be attempting to reach me through my relationship with my son, in this phase. Don't miss it, I say to myself. This isn't just about weathering a storm; it's about building a bridge. To build that bridge, I need my son, in every sense. No hidden half-truths, no secrets hiding behind forced smiles. I need him to show up, authentic and unfiltered, with the storm in his eyes and the sunshine in his laughter. But for that to happen, he needs to feel safe with me. The last thing he needs is fragile company, reacting with fear to his emotions.

What he needs is a steady presence, a calm amidst the chaos of his inner world. In the end, it is there—the inner world—where God desires to establish integrity; it is there that God will teach his wisdom (Ps. 51:6). How we show up with one another is deeply important to our journeys with Jesus. Reacting impulsively is easy. I need to resist the urge of my parents whenever I shared something they weren't ready to hear, or perhaps something that I said or did that they wouldn't have done themselves. It's the only way to understand him if I truly care to, at least. Instead, I listen openly, creating a safe haven for his words, no matter how difficult. My questions become guides, enlightening options without dictating his path.

My son needs to know, with unwavering certainty, that my love is without condition. We're navigating uncharted territory together, but we're not parenting the situation, we're parenting him. Every experience, light-hearted or difficult, clear or nuanced, holds the potential for growth—resilience, compassion, creativity. After all, isn't this the love we have received? There's risk in all of that, of course. The storm of the teenage years might rage, a rejection may balloon to feeling that the world is against them. It tests the strength of our connection. But the rewards, like the calm after a turbulent night, will be unbound. Perhaps we'll emerge stronger, our bond forged in shared vulnerability. And in that shared space, we'll find the magic in the bridge we built together.

GOD'S GOOD PROMISE

Blessed be the Lord. . .There has not failed one word of all His good promise.

1 Kings 8:56

When we purchase something of great value - a house, for example - we are usually required to put down a deposit to indicate our sincerity and to promise that our intentions are serious. That deposit is a form of insurance, a guarantee that adds substance to our word.

God has made some incredible promises to us - promises that stagger our imaginations. He has promised that we might have a relationship with Him through His Son. He has promised never to leave us or forsake us and to be with us always. He has promised to take us to Heaven when we die. The Bible is full of God's promises.

Someone might ask, "What insurance do we have that God is serious? How do we know His promises can be trusted?" God's deposit is the most precious investment anyone could make: His Son, who by His death and resurrection purchased our salvation - completely and fully. Not only is Jesus Christ a sufficient "down payment" on God's promises. He is, in fact, payment in full!!
